Ganaraska River

Stand on the Rotary Park walkway bridge and watch the current – and the fish – of the majestic Ganaraska River. It flows right through the heritage downtown and out into Lake Ontario.

Laveanne Lavender Fields

More than IO,OOO plants explode into a purple haze in the summertime at this country farm. Breathe in the blissful scent as you walk the rows or try a morning yoga class among the blooms.

Downtown Port Hope

TVOntario named Walton Street the Best Preserved Main Street in the province for staying true to its historic architecture. Take in the postcard-pretty details of building façades and shop windows.

Ganaraska Forest

Climb high up in the trees with Treetop Trekking, or walk or bike the well-marked trails to experience the wildlife and calming natural beauty. This is one of the largest forest in southern Ontario.

Richardson's Lookout

Get a fresh perspective at this popular lookout at Richardson's Conservation Area just west of Garden Hill. You'll find dreamy views of the forests and hills of Port Hope countryside.

Corbett's Dam Fish Ladder

One of Mother Nature's wonders! See some of the 5,000 to 10,000 chinook and silvery coho salmon swim upstream and jump the ladder to migrate north every year to their spawning grounds.




CELEBRATE THE HARVEST WITH GROWERS, CHEFS AND ARTISTS

Imagine taking a long weekend to slow things down, kick off your shoes in the grass and hang out with friends and family. Eat fresh, local food like Osland Farm steak with Ferguson Farm potato French fries. Watch painters and sculptors doing their thing. Learn about hen-keeping and foraging,

while the kids learn to make comics or applesauce. Add in some craft brews and a lineup of great music from here and away in the bandshell. The Cultivate Festival in Memorial Park from September 25 to 27 is the big harvest season bash that makes us proud to live in a small, tight-knit community. "We bring in world-class talent and then we weave those talents with locally-grown artists making it something that feels authentically Port Hope," says festival director Jeff Bray. "It's a first-class festival people are happy to travel to and discover." Best moment in Cultivate history? Lemon Bucket Orkestra, a "Ukrainian party punk" band in 2019, Bray says.

The towering 25-foot-tall Optimus Prime certainly gets your attention at Primitive Designs. The famous Port Hope destination has been named one of Canada's Top Roadside Attractions. It is! The collection of international metal sculptures, art and wood carvings from diverse places like Thailand, Morocco and Java will make your head spin with delight. It's an indoor and outdoor marketplace that stokes your imagination. Don't forget to pet the metallic alligator.



MEET THE MAKERS: RON DACEY AND RHONDA COOK

The couple travels in the off-season to source goods and develop their own designs with artists. "The people we work with in these countries are always happy to see us. Then it's moving the cargo from the artist to the containers, running around by motorbikes, boat, planes and cars. We have 10 transport truck loads on the sea heading for our gallery." Look for huge crystals from the Himalayas.





THE NOOKS: A PERFECT INDIE CRAFT BAZAAR

PORT HOPE INCUBATOR FOR LOCAL ARTISANS

The bright, airy downtown shop is a pleasure to browse through. It's divided into four-foot gallery "nooks" to showcase the works of area makers. You'll find herbal-scented body balms and bath salts, handmade jewelry, succulent plant terrariums and repurposed pieces. It's a great spot for gifts or treating yourself (and feeling good about supporting hometown crafters). Vendors pay a membership fee and receive IOO% of the revenue from sales.

MEET THE MAKER: COLLEEN IMRIE

The creative entrepreneur behind the Nooks is a Toronto resident who started out with a furniture consignment shop on Kingston Road when she recognized a need for artisans just starting out, not ready to commit to a retail space. She also runs Nook2Nook networking for makers and NookStart, a live pitch event for those seeking funding.







When you partner a farmers market with an arts marketplace and all sorts of creative types, it's a pretty cool party! The Port Hope Arts Festival in August shows off our artsy side with music performers in the bandshell at Memorial Park, gourmet candy floss (yes, really!), balloon making on demand, and handson events like crafting and scavenger

hunts. Lots of kid fun and great barbecue for the family. Just bring your sunscreen and make a day of it.

Next door, the long-loved art and farm vendor market behind Town Hall gets even bigger for this special Saturday event. You'll find local and regional handcrafted goods like jewelry, art cards, wall hangings and pottery for gifts and self-appreciation. And booths are overflowing with farm vegetables, fruits, flowers and amazing preserves and pies. You want pie for breakfast? This is the place to get it. Come mingle with the locals and make some new friends.







WE'LL PIQUE YOUR CURIOSITY

The First Nations people called the community Ganaraske, located where the river meets Lake Ontario, That's how the Ganaraska River, renowned

for exceptional fishing and the annual salmon migration, got its name. French fur traders came in the 168Os, but it wasn't until the late 1700s when Britain offered land arants to businessmen to form the 5th Township of Hope in 1792. And so it all began. Now our beautiful, lakeside community is a hub for tourists, naturelovers, new businesses and people who appreciate the serene quality of life.





The Capitol Theatre is a national historic site and one of Canda's first movie theatres. Musical theatre, concerts and a showcase for emerging local artists.

THE CAPITOL THEATRE IS A DESTINATION

VISITORS COME FROM THE GTA AND BEYOND FOR LIVE PRODUCTIONS

"Attending a play at the Capitol Theatre is an adventure in itself," says Artistic Director Susan Ferley. "You walk into our beautiful auditorium and find yourself in a medieval courtyard at twilight with stars twinkling overhead. It's magical. In a community that is committed to architectural conservation. the Capitol is a jewel."

It's true, the 90-year-old Port Hope treasure is a designated national historic site. It was built as one of the first movie

theatres by Famous Players, and opened on Friday, Aug. 15, 1930 screening the debut of Queen High with Ginger Rogers.

Now beautifully restored, thanks to a dedicated group of residents in the 1990s, the Cameco Capitol Arts Centre is an incredible venue for musical theatre, plays, concerts and films, including favourites from TIFF and a Vintage Film Festival. It's also a showcase for local and emerging talent with an intimate 100-seat theatre upstairs, The Sculthorpe, for performances and events.

The highly anticipated 2020 Theatre Season of Amazing Adventures will transport you to other places, like the era of the baby boomers in BOOM, Ferley says, "or a farmhouse in Canada, a seashore in Greece or the

There are also emotional journeys with the characters you'll meet to make you laugh, cheer and be inspired to be bold and brave. The filming was a huge boost to the local economy with production dollars and tourists coming

Even horror master Stephen King, a fan of small towns, stopped by for a visit and a personal tour with Mayor Bob Sanderson. Port Hope locals certainly enjoyed all the drama with film release events at the Capitol Theatre and a big street party downtown. Adam Pearson, owner of Queenies Bake Shop, suited up a Georgie mannequin with a yellow raincoat inside his store to promo the first film

release. He also left Georgie in surprising spots in a sewer and in the alleyway door of the Quality Meats butcher shop, which reverted back to the popular Gould's shoe store after the filming. Fans are welcome to experience the cast and crew-favourites, like shopping vintage gold at Thrill of the Find and Dwellissimo, and eating delicious bites at Trattoria Gusto and Olympus Burger. The Great Farini Tightrope Walk







ARTISTRY ON 23 HERITAGE BARNS

ROAD TRIP! EVERY BARN HAS A STORY Old barns are part of the cultural landscape, weathering the elements over the decades. Barn No. 3 on the tour is the Van Dorp farm at the corner of Sylvan Glen and Dale Road. The gold, red and blue quilt pattern is the Dutchman's Puzzle with the Dutch windmill and the corn that is grown on the land. The 200-acre property was first purchased by Elias Smith in 1799, one of the founders of Port Hope, and divided into lots for families until 1958. There's much more to see. The heritage homestead, run by the Port Hope and District Historical Society, will give you a taste of early farming life.



West Beach

East Beach

This riverside trail takes you past the downtown and into the woods.




CHEER ON THE SALMON AS THEY HEAD UPSTREAM TO SPAWN

Nature fans will be happy to know the Ganaraska River is one of the healthiest rivers around. It's populated almost entirely with wild naturallyreproducing fish, like the salmon that instinctively migrate upstream to return to the exact same streams they hatched in as young fish. Port Hope volunteers help out at the fish ladder at Corbett's Dam that has an infrared monitoring system to record the numbers and health of the magnificent fish jumping the rapids to head home. Spectators love to cheer them on!





Fish trivia: Chinook and silvery coho salmon migrate from Lake Ontario and swim up the Ganaraska River anytime from mid-August to early October. About 5,000 to 10,000 migrate to their spawning grounds every year. These beauties can weigh from 2 lbs up to 40 lbs and have a natural lifespan of two to five years. And they're natural reproducing, so there's no hatchery salmon in the river. For both species, they die after spawning, having contributed to the new and thriving fish population.




The other species you'll find here are rainbow trout and steelhead trout that also migrate from Lake Ontario and swim up the Ganaraska River to spawn every year from late March until early May, or through October until mid-December. These fish can weigh from 2 lbs up to 20 lbs, and as many as 18,000 in a year have migrated up the river to the delight of biologists and visitors. They live about 10 years and can spawn annually once they mature. Rainbow trout spawn four to six times in their lifetime.

The fish ladder at Corbett's Dam, the Ganaraska River Fishway, has the best vantage point for seeing these fish in action against the current. Locals and visitors come every weekend.



You'll also see the **pooling locations** for fish in the shallow water at various points along the Ganaraska River in town. Follow the ramps to get down lower for a look up close.

THE WILD RIVER RIDE YOU'LL **NEVER FORGET**

PACE OR CHEER AT THE FLOAT YOUR FANNY DOWN THE GANNY RACE

4-degrees Celsius. That's the average water temperature on race day at Port Hope's one-of-a-kind river ride in April. In other words, unless you want your fanny to get chilled in the icy water, wear a wetsuit. Even the thousands of spectators that come to town every year to see the competitive fun usually bundle up. This is not an event for the faint of heart, but for the fiercely determined and outrageously

costumed. The 10km paddle frenzy down the Ganaraska River has seen its share of serious kayakers and canoeists, alongside gung-ho Viking crews and black-hatted witches steering the 60 or more homemade "crazy crafts" that highlight the event.

Whatever floats your boat, go for it! The annual race commemorates the town's devastating flood of 1980 when a deluge of rain on March 21 caused the river to rise and flood the streets in the core. Locals like to reminisce about the power outage. the evacuation, the crumbling buildings and huge slabs of ice and river rock the current pushed out to Lake Ontario. But even more than that, they're proud of a community that rallied to help pile sandbags to redirect the water. The people of Port Hope came out by the

The community regrouped and rebuilt, and decided to celebrate the comeback by making the most of the mighty Ganaraska River with a yearly race that could very well freeze your butt off.

Beware of water guns and salty sailors! Come visit Port Hope on Saturday, April II and you'll see exactly what we mean.





Moonlight and Pines


This country retreat sits on four acres with pine trees and a horse trail, right across from adventures in the Gangraska Forest.
